10 Tips on Courtroom Etiquette for Lawyers

- 1. DO: Stand when addressing the court.

- 3. DO: Ask permission before approaching any witness or the bench.
- 4. DO: Properly lay the foundation for a document before offering it into evidence.
- 5. DO: Build credibility by acting with civility and professionalism at all times.
- 6. DON'T: Object before your opponent has finished asking the question.
- 7. DON'T: Continue to argue once a ruling has been made after you have created a record.
- 8. DON'T: Address your comments to the opposing counsel instead of the court.
- 9. DON'T: Interrupt opposing counsel when they are asking a question or addressing the court.
- 10. DON'T: Badmouth opposing counsel or the opposing party.
